
ABOUT THE BARGE MENOMINEE AND TUG OLIVE L. MOORE

Rand Logistics, Inc. acquired the barge Menominee (formerly the Lewis J. Kuber) and tug Olive L. Moore in February 2011. The Articulated Tug and Barge (ATB) is a US-flagged vessel and is operated by Rand's subsidiary, Grand River Navigation. The barge was renamed in May 2017 as the ATB completed fit out.

The barge was originally built as a straight deck bulker in 1952 by Bethlehem-Sparrows Point Shipyard in Sparrows Point, Maryland and became a self-unloading vessel in 1980. In 2006, the vessel completed a conversion to a new articulated self-unloading notched barge.

The tug was built in 1928 by Manitowoc Ship Building Inc. in Manitowoc, Wisconsin. In 2005, the pusher tug Olive L. Moore underwent modifications including installation of a raised pilothouse and was paired with barge Lewis J. Kuber (now the Menominee) in 2006 as an ATB with a combined length of 728 feet.

Cargo carried on the Menominee includes grain, stone, iron ore, coal, and other bulk commodities.

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MORE ABOUT THE ARTICULATED TUG AND BARGE

Keeping with the Company's tradition of naming its vessels after native North American waterways and regions, the Menominee is named after the Menominee River in northwestern Michigan and northeastern Wisconsin. The name of this 116-mile river comes from an Ojibwe Algonquian term meaning 'wild rice' or 'in the place of wild rice.'

The Menominee originated as a conventional bulker, built in 1952. One of Rand's Canadian-flagged self-unloading bulk freighters, the M/V Michipicoten, is a sister ship also built in 1952. Rand purchased the Lewis J. Kuber (now the Menominee)/Olive L. More and the James L. Kuber/Victory simultaneously.
